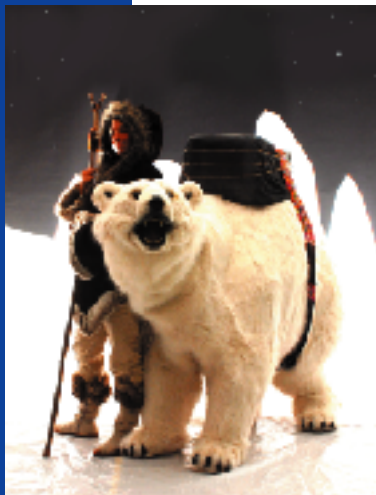

Affordable loans for those who live or work in Berkshire



Community Savings and Loans (CSL) is a credit union providing savings opportunities and affordable loans to those who live or work in Berkshire. As a not for profit organisation it relies on volunteers and partners to deliver its services across the county.

CSL, originally Reading Credit Union, decided to go county wide in 2010 and was very fortunate to be given space as its base for West Berkshire in Broadway House, Newbury by Greenham Common Trust. From the outset, the Trust has been a great help to CSL and is one of our key partners.

Partnerships are key to enabling CSL to connect with the savers who want to help their community and with those who are struggling and are unable to get help from high street banks and may be forced into borrowing at very high rates of interest, sometimes at over 4,000% APR!

CSL also joins with partners to spread the word at local events. Recently they partnered with housing association A2Dominion at their Foundry Court Estate and are planning an event in January with the Trading Standards, Stop Loan Sharks Team at the Community Centre, Greenham.

"We want to give people long term financial control and peace of mind, especially in these difficult times," said Jim Coghill, Chairman of CSL.

"To deliver this mission we rely on partners to help spread the word, volunteers to deliver the services and savers to provide the funds we use to give affordable loans to those in the local community who are not so well off," he added.

findmeagr^{ant}

Around 150 voluntary and community groups in West Berkshire and North Hampshire found themselves over £240,000 better off thanks to grants given out via the new online grant application system www.findmeagr^{ant}.org

The funding web portal, launched in September by Greenham Common Trust in partnership with Conifer Consulting Ltd, has attracted considerable interest. The Trust and many of its partners have all used findmeagr^{ant} to allocate grants to local groups in need.

As well as being easy to use - just one simple online application to access multiple streams of grant funding - what makes findmeagr^{ant} even more beneficial for local fundraising is the new Trust Top-Up grant scheme for public donations (matched funding up to £5,000 per project and the administration of Gift Aid). In just 10 weeks this has raised well over £17,000 for local organisations.

Bucklebury Wolves Football Club has had two applications fully funded using this scheme, one of them in just six weeks, giving them the financial stability they need next year without the need to seek further funding.

Club Secretary and Coach Jonathan Poole said: "The response was frankly overwhelming, with one parent donating £250 and many others donating at least £20."

St George's Church has raised over £11,000 through donations, Trust Top-Up and Gift Aid towards the latest fundraising for its renewable energy scheme.

The Trust has distributed over £170,000 of reactive grants through findmeagr^{ant}.

Trust Chief Executive Stuart Tagg added: "You can keep your applications on findmeagr^{ant} for 18 months, giving you access to multiple grant rounds and the potential to raise money through public donations, Trust Top-Up and Gift Aid."

A conservation garden at Greenham Business Park

Conservation volunteers have teamed up with people with learning disabilities to create a living landscape garden at the Slater Centre at Greenham Business Park.

The wildlife garden will have six habitats - wildflower meadow, heathland, woodland, pond, bog garden and herbaceous border outside the Slater Centre - each reflecting the important conservation work carried out by Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust (BBOWT) at Greenham and Crookham Common.

Based at the purpose-built Slater Centre, created by the Trust for West Berks Mencap Link-up and Newbury Community Resource Centre to manage as a shared learning, training and employment resource for disadvantaged and those with learning difficulties, the garden was the brainchild of BBOWT Trainee Jenny Dawe.

She said: "We want to create an educational, enjoyable and inspirational resource for people in the local community through community engagement and partnership with local organisations and to create a refuge amidst an urban area for wildlife."

The garden reflects the objectives behind BBOWT's Living Landscapes model by generating an understanding that species span several habitats types.

"The links between these habitats need to be preserved or created in order for species survival," added Jenny.

West Berkshire Mencap Link-Up is preparing the six habitats in the garden with support from Newbury Community Resource Centre and horticultural therapy project Growing4all.

As well as enhancing wildlife conservation the garden will be a peaceful area for staff, service users and visitors.

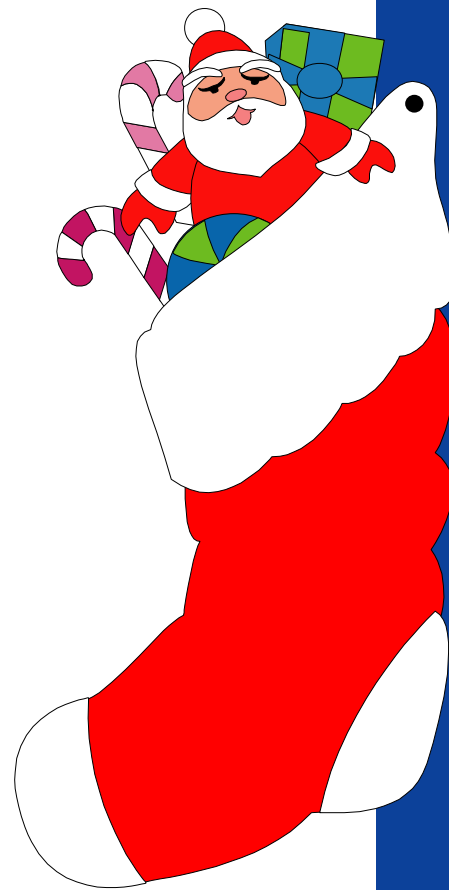
give a child a toy for Christmas

There are families on very low incomes, in debt, homeless, awaiting benefit determination, or living in a Refuge, who will find it very hard this year to give their children any toys at all."

The Appeal needs unwrapped toys, games and gifts suitable for boys and girls from newborn right up to 19+. Second hand things are not suitable for this appeal.

Drop off points for toys and vouchers will be advertised on posters, in the NWN and on Newbury Sound website, www.newburysound.co.uk.

The toys are collected by Swift Couriers and are delivered to a local exchange centre where families can visit to exchange their voucher for a toy or toys for their children. The centre is staffed completely by volunteers.

The last date for donations is December 22. Collections need to be given in gift vouchers please, as the Appeal does not have the facility to manage cash. Newbury MP Richard Benyon recently visited Greenham Business Park to officially inaugurate the UK's latest and most advanced Additive Manufacturing machine at 3T RPD.

Additive Manufacturing (AM), also known as 3D printing, has been described in the media as 'the industrial revolution of the digital age' and 3T is at the forefront of developing the technology and its applications.

Speaking at the launch, Mr Benyon said: "This technology plays to some of this country's innate talents such as our characteristic inventiveness and entrepreneurial spirit. I see the work of 3T as taking a vital step towards a brighter future for British manufacturing."

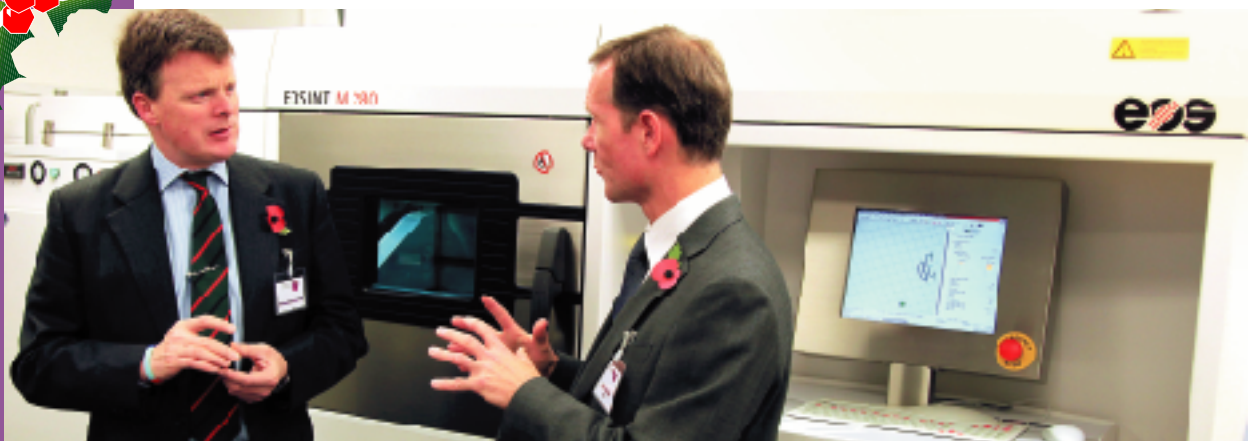
The new machine (an EOSINT M 280) makes metal parts directly from digital data. It builds an item, layer by layer, from

metal powder which is selectively melted by a powerful laser which is guided by CAD data. This then solidifies, creating an accurate, high quality part which can be used in the aerospace industry, in a racing car, by a surgeon for implants and many other applications.

This new development will lead to at least one additional job being created and further recruitment likely as production levels increase.

Commenting on AMs potential 3T's CEO Ian Halliday said: "We are already the UK's leading metal and plastic AM provider and are the first UK Company to be commercially operating an M 280. This new machine is faster and more accurate and will build the highest quality metal parts currently available in the UK which gives us and our customers a significant competitive advantage."

new community shop

Headley Community Shop has opened its doors thanks to the support of Greenham Common Trust and the hard work and commitment of local residents.

The Trust bought the former Headley Baptist Chapel in 2009 after being approached by local residents who needed help to secure the future of their community enterprise.

Vice chairman of Headley with Ashford Hill Community Shop Association Richard Bayly said: "We heard the village shop was closing so we got together to form a community association and started fundraising so we could take over and run the shop. The lease was running out and there were a few problems with the building so we approached Greenham Common Trust for help."

"To our surprise the Trust said they would buy the former Chapel for us and let us have it rent free," added the Association's fundraiser Sue Crook.

The shop is run as a not-for-profit community association and any profit made is either ploughed back into the shop or made available for charitable purposes.

It is staffed by a few local people but mainly volunteers, who also helped construct and currently maintain the building.

As well as selling the usual products, the shop also has a Post Office and a café community corner where people can donate books and, for a small charge, people loan them and return them for other local residents. It has also agreed to sell local meat, vegetables and confectionery and hopes to be able to sell local crafts soon.

Richard said: "This project would not have been possible without the help of Greenham Common Trust and the considerable commitment and enthusiasm of local residents. We simply would not have been able to afford it. Their support and advice and financial assistance has been amazing."

"Could we have completed this without the help of Greenham Common Trust? No, absolutely not," added Sue.
